ALICE ROGERS: A CHANGE-MAKING FLAME KEEPER

Graduating in 1958 from then-Woodbury College with a degree in Studio Executive Secretarial, Ms. Rogers has visited Woodbury twice in the past two years, to attend the alumni event in July. Aside from a proud Woodbury alumna, Alice is a longtime resident from Mililani, a city located near the center of the island of O'ahu in Honolulu County, Hawai'i. After excelling in a variety of administrative positions, Alice took on some prominent roles, such as serving on the Cypress City Council, as Mayor, Vice-Mayor, and Councilman, a title she successfully turned around into Councilwoman -along with a team of women- in 1972. By 1978, Ms. Rogers was elected President of the Orange County League of Cities, the second woman in 50 years to hold that position! Alice is still very socially active on the Mililani Neighborhood Board, Friends of the Library, and as a volunteer for other non-profits, among which, the Woodbury University School of Business Alumni Advisory Council! This year, Alice Rogers was awarded the 2023 flame keeper alumna award.



ALEX DADASHEV: MENTORING ACCOUNTING GRADUATES

School of Business alumnus Alex Dadashev may have graduated from the School of Business with his Bachelor of Business Administration degree in Accounting in 2012, but that was not the end of his journey with Woodbury.

THOUGHT LEADERSHIP SERIES

Earlier this year, the School of Business started a new monthly thought leadership series, whereby a business faculty member conducts a free virtual presentation on a

topic within their area of expertise. These presentations are made available to the local and global community. Following presentations from Dr. Joan Marques (February), Dr. Alice Shiotsugu and Jeff Neumeister (March), and Dr. Satinder Dhiman (April), the following three additional presentations have been delivered:



Dr. Thomas Chapman: Public Perceptions of AI: An Honest Discussion of the Perils and Promises of the Technology

On May 25, Dr. Chapman addressed some of the most pressing concerns regarding Artificial Intelligence (AI), while he also advocated for openness to this phenomenon, that has been a part of our lives for multiple decades already. As AI continues to sweep through today's professional performance world, the presentation was wellreceived. Dr. Chapman chairs the CIS department, conducts his research in the areas of cybersecurity, analytics, block chain and digital currencies, and social inclusion in IT. He is a professional member of the Association of Information Systems (AIS) and the Foundation for IT Education.



Dr. Paul Sabolic: The Business Plan: Key Sections

On June 29, Dr. Paul Sabolic, the School of Business' foundational professor of entrepreneurship and consultancy, shared some powerful insights in business plan structuring and presentation, while also explaining the most common perils in the process of putting together such a project.

A visiting professor in Business, Dr. Sabolic has a multi-decade experience in business and management with multinational corporations and in the academic and administrative. His expertise encompasses management, marketing, economics, media studies, information technology and education.



Dr. Kevin Sanford: Aspects of Organizational Culture: One Team, One Mission, One Goal

On July 27th, Dr. Kevin Sanford shared his insights on "Aspects of Organizational Culture: One Team, One Mission, One Goal". In this well-attended session, Dr. Sanford addressed some critical focus points in organizational performance, with respect, appreciation, and empathy being some of the mindful points he mentioned to underscore his call for team-spirit and maintaining a strong mission focus. Dr. Sanford teaches management classes at Woodbury, and has been a faculty member at Los Angeles Valley College in a variety of roles for the last nine years. Prior to his teaching career, Dr. Sanford spent over 15 years in the United States Marine Corps.

WOODBURY MANAGEMENT FACULTY TEAM PRESENTS AT ACADEMY OF MANAGEMENT'S 83RD ANNUAL MEETING

In early August, a management faculty team visited the prestigious annual conference of the Academy of Management (AOM), world's largest congregation of management scholars. This year's conference theme was "*Putting the Worker Front and Center*". The five management faculty members attending the conference, which was held in Boston this year, collaborated in multiple presentations.





Dr. Joan Marques chaired and co-presented a panel symposium titled, "*Revitalizing Work: Taking the Mindful Path Toward Greater Collective Fulfillment.*" In her role as the Scholarly Program Chair within the leadership track of AOM's Management, Spirituality and Religion (MSR) division, she was responsible this year for coordinating the entire review and planning process for all scholarly submissions to MSR, as well as the organization of a series of major events at the annual meeting, such as the MSR Plenary session, the MSR & Friends Social session, the daily morning meditation sessions, and the clustering of paper presentations.

Dr. Satinder Dhiman served as co-author and session co-chair of the showcase symposium: "*Management and World Peace*", and presenter in the Professional Development Workshops, "*Four Yogic Pathways of the Bhagavad Gita for Workers in Pandemic Times*", and "*Ghandi's Dignified Approach to Work and Workers.*"





Dr. Adam Wood, Dr. Svetlana Holt, and Dr. Kevin Sanford presented a scholarly paper, titled, "From the Military to Civilian Work Environment: A Study of Veterans' Career Transition."


The article titled <u>"The Fascinating Path Ahead for Business Schools"</u> addressed a number of contemporary topics, including,
